


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Crowded In The Middle Of Nowhere: Tales Of Humor And Healing From Rural America

While the setting was familiar to me as a Texan, the attitude toward his work reminded me of the book *All Creatures Great and Small*. But the situations were obviously caused by people who did not really love their animals. His fatigue was perfectly described--much like many a human doctor who seldom gets enough sleep. I would definitely recommend this book for anyone who knows and loves their animals and the men and women who are willing to face fangs and fury when caring for them.

It was hard to put down, so I carried my Kindle everywhere with me and read at every and any opportunity!
